The Borders Distillery, which opened in 2018, is the first new, legal distillery to be founded in the Borders Region of Scotland in over 138 years and takes pride in the art of distilling and blending – whether it be making their own spirit to become Single Malt Scotch Whisky or selecting and marrying others from across Scotland. This unique blend of the finest malt Scottish whiskies is inspired by the ingenuity, determination, and pioneering spirit of the Fraser Clan.

THE RESERVE is a triple distilled Lowlands whisky which region is typically characterized by the notes of grass, honeysuckle, cream, toffee, cinnamon, citrus, and ginger. These descriptions of Lowlands whisky are one of the reasons that the region is touted as the home of “The Lowland Ladies”. It should be noted that being triple distilled increases the alcohol content during the process which removes the heavier components such as oils and proteins found in other ocean-oriented regional spirits. This, in turn, gives THE RESERVE a lighter, smoother taste and finish.

### ***Professional whisky tasters have described THE RESERVE as:***

**NOSE:** Delicately sweet peat smoke, honeyed and buttery with hints of cinnamon and vanilla. The solvent and astringent green notes diminish on the nose with time, but the palate and finish remain.

**PALATE:** Fragrant blossom honey, raisins and figs, sweet butterscotch, and light peat smoke. The mouthfeel is very light highlighting the ultra-smooth taste

**FINISH:** A well rounded finish, creamy vanilla with a very, very gentle peat smoke.

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# Kirkin' o' the Tartan Service

9.15 am Sunday - Pastor Phillip Cross - Main Stage

The story of the Kirkin' O' the Tartan is a modern one. "Kirk" is a Scottish word meaning church, and in Scotland the kirk refers to the (Presbyterian) Church of Scotland.

The Kirkin' uses some order from a Scottish service but is an American invention, and was first held on April 27th, 1941, by the late Dr. Peter Marshall, Scottish born Chaplain of the U.S. Senate and Minister of the New York Avenue Presbyterian Church, Washington, D.C.

After Dr. Marshall's death in the early 1950's, the Kirkin' moved from place to place and in 1954 was held at the Washington National Cathedral where it has been held ever since, and it is still sponsored by the St. Andrew's Society.

With the recent increase in Scottish Clan activities, the Kirkin' O' the Tartan has spread across the United States and Canada. The display of the tartans at a Kirkin' represents the Scottish Clans. The word Clan means family and identity can be attached to the Chief of the Clan.

Not be confused with individual dances like the Highland Fling or Sword Dances, country dancing is a couple's dance. It is much like the type of dancing seen in period drama films. Some calls Scottish Country Dancing the ancestor of American Square Dancing. It is a wonderful way to enjoy the music of Scotland, to meet new friends, and to exercise!

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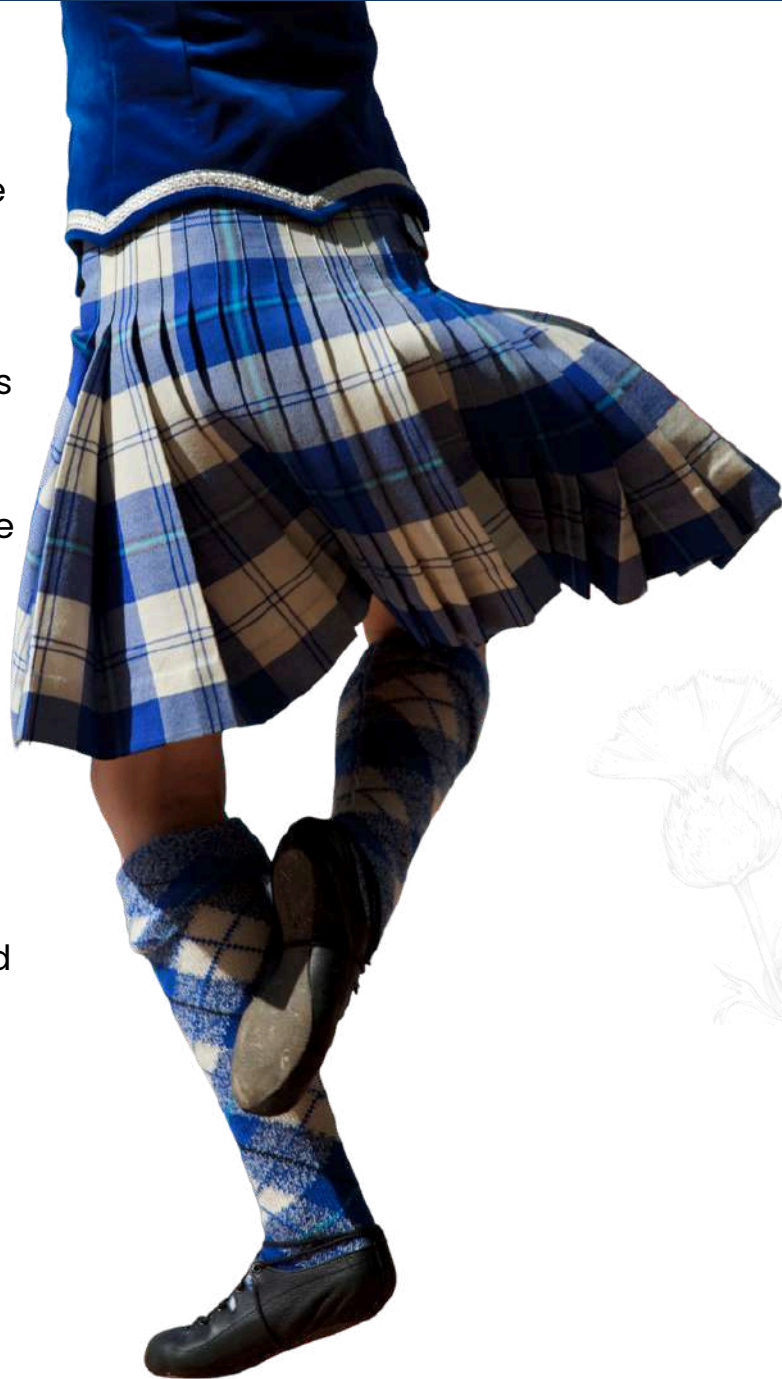
# Highland Dancing History

## The Highland Fling

Some say the Fling was inspired by the sight of a red deer stag prancing on the hillside. This dance copies the movements of the stag with hands raised antler-like, springing and turning with feet raised to the knee. The warriors made this dance a feat of strength and agility. Dancing on their upturned shields it was important to dance on the spot so as not to impale their feet on the sharp spike of steel protruding from the center.

## The Sword Dance or Gillie Callum

This dance demands a strong performance, neatness in crossing the blades and precision in turning. It is said the original Gillie Callum was Malcolm Canmore, a Celtic Prince who fought a battle in 1054. In celebration of victory, he crossed his opponent's sword with his own and danced over it with joy. Another tale has it that warriors would cross their swords over their opponents before a battle. Together they danced over the swords. If the warrior touched the sword it was a bad omen and was thought to mean certain injury or death in battle.



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# Highland Dancing History

## **The Seann Truibhas (Old Trousers)**

Dating back to 1745, the Act of Proscription prohibited the wearing of the kilt, playing bagpipes and dancing. It was considered an act of treason. This dance originated as a political protest. The beautiful, graceful slow steps reflect the Scot's desire to "Shed the hated English Trousers" and once again wear the beloved kilt. The quick time in the dance recreates the Highlanders' great joy in the ban being lifted as the steps become light and merry.

## **The Reels**

The reels have always been group dances for recreation. The Reel O'Tulloch is said to have originated at Tulloch Churchyard where on a cold snowy morning, the minister was delayed and the congregation started to swing each other by the arm to keep themselves warm. The slow movement, the Strathspey is thought by many to be a mourning dance following the path of the river "Strath" in the valley of "Spey". The Highland Reel is a quick, livelier version of the Strathspey.

## **The Sailor's Hornpipe**

The Sailor's Hornpipe requires strength and stamina to mimic in dance a variety of shipboard tasks including swabbing the deck, climbing the ship's rigging, standing watch and hauling in rope. The Hornpipe is danced in a British sailor's uniform and derived its name from the fact that usually the musical accompaniment was played on a hornpipe rather than bagpipes.

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# Sheepdog Trials

Sheep Dog Trials originated in the 1870's in bala, Wales, when groups of shepherds congregated to compare who had the best dogs. Such competitions grew in popularity, and the International Sheep Dog Society was founded in 1902 with the first registry of working sheep dogs in Britain. Trials began in the United States in 1890 when the first event was held in Pennsylvania. National/ International courses are the ultimate demonstrations of teamwork between the dogs and their handlers. The National Course consists of a 400 yard 'gather' in which sheep are located 400 yards from the handler. The handler communicates with the dogs with a shepherd's whistle using four basic commands: 'left-go-by', 'right-away to me', 'stop', and 'walk straight-up'.



To begin, the sheep are brought through one set of gates to the handler, around the handler, then driven away to a second set of gates 150 yards away. The sheep are next forced to make a hard right turn to the next gate, another 150 yards away, and are gathered in a 40 yard diameter ring. The dog and handler are asked to 'cut' two sheep away from the flock (no small trick for a dog that instinctively wants to keep the sheep together). Once they are all in, they are returned to the ring, where the whole exercise is repeated, this time cutting only one sheep from the flock. Throughout the entire trial, the handler is stationed at an assigned post, and cannot leave that post until the gates, cutting, and penning are completed and the dog had brought the flock back to a 'shed' (a small circular finish line).

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# Heavy Athletics History

Whenever you hear of talk about Scottish Games, it's most likely about the athletic events which started today's kind of meeting more than a thousand years ago. Celtic warriors displayed their bravery and strength by performing various feats of skill and power in front of their opponents. There are many legends of how Scottish Games and Gatherings began, but the most credible rises from the need of each Clan's chief to find out who among his warriors was best prepared for battle.

In order to see who could best make a log bridge over the many streams in the Highlands, the Caber Toss developed. To determine who was simply the strongest amongst the clansmen, several throwing events were created. It may look like a simple matter of physical strength, but each event you watch today requires not only strength but also excellent timing and balance.

## **Weight Toss (for Height)**

The objective is to toss the weight up and over a pole vault bar.

## **Weight Throw(for distance)**

A ring handle is attached to the weight by a chain for an overall length of 18". The weight is thrown one handed from behind with a 9' run-up allowed. Any style may be used with the most efficient being to spin like a discus thrower.

## **Hammer Throw**

The original hammer used in Scotland was that used by the men in quarries mining granite. In America initially it was the heavy, long handed blacksmith's hammer. Today the hammer head is round and made of metal. The handle is made of can (or PVC pipe) with an overall length of 50". The contestants usually take the hammer 3 times around the head before letting it go. No part of the body may cross the trig and the competitors feet may not move until after the hammer is thrown. The competitor must stay stationery and cannot touch the top of the trig nor the ground beyond the trig before or after the throw. Measurement is from the point of the trig where the throw is made to the nearest break in the ground.

## **Braemar Stone**

The braemar Stone Put has an ancient and easy to identify history. It was common practice for early Highland Chieftains to have a large stone outside their gatepost and challenges of strength and endurance were easily made to a visiting clan and its 'heavy' warriors.

## **Caber Toss**

The tossing of the Caber (meaning 'pole', 'rafter', or 'tree') is probably the most famous of the Scottish events. It is one of the most traditional (dating from the 16th Century where it may have begun as a military discipline developed to breach fortifications and barriers).

It is definitely one of the most spectacular events as it measures strength, balance, timing and accuracy. The caber is a straight, tapered log of no fixed weight or dimensions. The weight of the caber varies from 50-130lbs and is usually between 14 and 20 feet in length. length is a greater handicap than weight. To toss the caber, the competitor lifts it up, balances it in a vertical position with his or her hands underneath, the caber resting against the shoulder. Keeping his/her balance, the competitor runs to build up speed and momentum. The caber must flip end- over-end and fall pointing away from the competitor. Scoring is based on the closeness of the fall to the '12 o'clock" position. Points are deducted according to the number of degrees the lay of the caber varies from the perfect 12 o'clock position.



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# Rob McIntock – California School of Piping & Drumming



The California Summer School of Piping and Drumming offers intensive instruction by professional instructors in each discipline.

Optional classes are offered in the afternoon, such as pipe band techniques, bagpipe and reed maintenance, and piobaireachd.

Most evenings we will have a lecture by one of the instructors followed by a recital by another instructor.

The Army and Navy Academy is a military prep school during the regular school year. Its campus is located on beachfront property in the beautiful resort town of Carlsbad, in North San Diego County.

The school of piping and drumming is always held the week before the games.
